# Airbnb renters charges with theft of furniture, appliances

Huronia West OPP have arrested and charged a couple of thieves who made off with furniture and appliances from an Airbnb rental in Clearview Township.

On March 16, police responded to the reported theft by a male and female from Meaford. Members from Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) conducted further investigation which led to a storage locker in the Collingwood area that had been rented by the accused. A search warrant was executed at the storage facility where some of the stolen property was located.

Christopher Bikker, 43, and Nicole Swann, 36, were both arrested and charged with Theft Over \$5,000 and Possession of Property Over \$5,000.

## Student creativity contributes to mural project

Art students at Stayner Collegiate Institute will see their work unveiled at a special ceremony on July 10. The mural has been commissioned by the Clearview Chamber of Commerce to decorate the Tourism Centre on Huron Street.

Rhonda Broderick, a director of the chamber says, "I have wanted a mural for years. We have so many talented artists in town and this is a way to celebrate all the talent and history of the area."

Under the direction of art teacher **Angie Kerr**, students created four panels depicting the year round beauty of Clearview. The mural will show the tulip garden in spring, the gazebo in summer, the rolling farm country in autumn and the sparkling lights of the giant snowflake displays in local parks each winter. Broderick says the

images reflect the roots, heritage and values of the community.

"If you live in Clearview, when you look at the mural you will feel a connection," she said.

It was important to Broderick to involve young artists in creating something that will be proudly displayed in the community for years to come

"Ultimately, this became a part of the curriculum and their final grades," she said. "The school was incredibly supportive and we are hopeful that creating public art in Clearview will become a regular part of the curriculum going forward."

Broderick says no taxpayer funds were used in the creation of the mural. The chamber purchased wood, paint and plexiglass, and Stayner Home Hardware generously donated paint (See "Unveiling" on page 3)



trays, rollers and brushes. Labour was provided by art students at no cost. Township staff will be responsible for the actual installation of the finished panels.

It was decided to have the panels painted at the school, versus creating the mural on site at the Tourism Centre, to allow more time for students to actually work on the art rather than spending class time commuting to the site. It also alleviated the need to have students climbing ladders, which would have been a health and safety concern.

Students worked on the panels for about two months. Kerr says at any given time, there were 10-12 students involved.

"Christopher Stephens, a co-op student helped me with a lot of the project and students in my Grade 11 art classes chose to replace a sculpture project mark with a mark for working on the mural," said Kerr. "Many other students simply volunteered their time during lunch or spare period to work on the community project."

Broderick is hopeful that the mural will be well received, and already has plans for more public art. She is currently working to secure approval for more sites, and plans are underway for more panels to be painted at the school through the coming winter.

The unveiling ceremony will begin at 6 p.m. on Wednesday, July 10 at the Clearview Tourism Centre, 220 Huron St. Free cake, courtesy of J&R Cycle, will be served after the ribbon cutting and unveiling. In case of rain, the event will be held on July 17.





## Survey says people trust The Echo and use it to stay connected

During *The Creemore Echo*'s 2024 subscription drive we asked the community to participate in a readers' survey. It had been a decade since we last conducted a survey and with so many changes in the media landscape and an increase in our distribution area, we thought it was time to ask the community if they are reading *The Echo*? – What they like about it and what they don't like? We distributed the survey by e-mail, on our website, and in the paper. We also went with clipboards in hand to farmers' markets in Creemore and Stayner. We thank all who took a moment to provide feedback, good and bad. Truly, the constructive criticism is just as welcome as the support and encouragement.

In total we received 350 responses 132 (38 per cent) from Creemore, 86 (25 per cent) from Stayner and 30 (nine per cent) from Nottawa, and smaller numbers from other communities which revealed the following:

Ninety-two per cent of respondents said they read *The Echo* weekly, with the top three sections being:

- 93 per cent saying they usually read the news,
- 81 per cent reading features about local people and businesses and;
  - 80 per cent reading the community calendar.

Respondents regularly noted that they read the paper cover to cover and like all of the sections of the paper.

When asked, how important is *The Echo* to the community? 94.5 cent ranked the importance of the newspaper at 8-10.

When asked, how much do you trust *The Echo?* 91 per cent raking their level of trust between 8-10.

Eighty-seven per cent said they use *The Creemore Echo* to stay connected to the community and 84.5 per cent said, in the past year, they had contacted a business or attended an event after seeing an advertisement in *The Creemore Echo*, while 82 per cent said in the past year they had contacted a business or attended an event after reading an article in *The Creemore Echo*.

This tells us that a significant number of people utilize the local newspaper as a way of staying informed and that it is considered to be trusted source of news and information and an important way to connect the community. It also tells us that it is a reliable tool for businesses and organizations that wish to spread the word about events and services.

In this we feel that we are accomplishing our mission to inform and build community.

As readers know, our expanded distribution into Stayner, New Lowell and Nottawa is part of a pilot project and we are currently crunching the numbers to see if we can continue sending the paper to those households. However, the survey has shown that although people are reading *The Echo*, they don't always want to pay for it, so we must find a balance.

## Hobbyist stitches second act

Did you have an interest or hobby when you were a young child that fascinated and captivated you? A passion that you loved, could do all day and kept you up at night, lying in bed, just thinking about it? For some, that could

have been outer space, baking, guitar, baseball statistics or horses. For **Patty Lant**, founder of Jardin Bleu, it was sewing.

"I can remember, about the age of six, taking a trip across the county with my mom and my sister," said Lant. "My mom wanted to keep us occupied sitting on the train so she got us little cross-stitch kits. I was completely hooked. I loved it from the moment it was placed in my hands, and have never stopped."

Fast forward many years and a significant corporate career later, Lant and her mom **Shirley** are still at it as the creative duo behind Jardin Bleu's stunning linen and cotton creations.

"My mom always did a lot of sewing," said Lant. "Growing up, I was surrounded by the rhythmic sound of the sewing machine humming as my mom made beautiful things for our home, clothes for my dolls and later, for me. Inspired, I started to create my own work. Looking back, no matter what my personal and professional responsibilities were, sewing has always been part of my life."

Making the decision to leave a 25-year career at Bell and launch Jardin Bleu was not one Lant took lightly. Over time however, she started to notice that she was no longer interested in climbing the corporate ladder as she once was. Signs of work lethargy started to set in.

"On conference calls, I'd find myself day dreaming about fabrics," she said, "and I realized that while I loved my job and was very grateful for my career, my heart was simply not in it anymore."

When life threw her a difficult curve ball with a serious family accident, it sealed her decision and gave her the perspective she needed: Stop doing



stuff you don't like doing and focus on things that are important to you and that you enjoy. Lant picked up her needle and thread.

Starting slowly and carefully, Lant made a set of napkins for a friend's birthday to test her abilities.

The reaction gave her all the assurance she needed to keep going, especially as other friends started to make requests. With the support of Tierra Hermosa's commitment to local artisans, Jardin Bleu was launched.

Lant's work combines sewing, design, fabrics and her love of organic things, like gardening, nature, and flowers. Jardin Bleu creates women's clothing, home décor items such as cushions, cocktail and dinner napkins, table runners, table cloths and Christmas décor. The most popular are the personalized dog bandanas and reversible seasonal placemats for year-round use, with spring colours on one side and holiday cheer on the other.

Using very high quality cotton and wonderfully soft Belgian linens, Lant creates her own collection but also takes custom orders from people looking for décor items that enhance their current colour schemes and size requirements. Her mom provides beautiful detailing on the fabrics by designing sketches and artwork.

"Turning a hobby that I have had my entire life into something that is bigger is the perfect combination of passion and purpose," she said.
